  - Remember you need to get a total of 25 hours of community service per year (100 total as a graduation requirement)

This can be kept electronically in a Word document or on paper as an ongoing list. It will be a very helpful resource when applying for colleges in senior year.

### Spring

This gives some very valuable feedback on college readiness. Take time to practice your skills using the official SAT Practice set up by Khan Academy <a href="https://www.khanacademy.org/sat">https://www.khanacademy.org/sat</a>. The practice is personalized based on the student's responses in prior PSAT and SAT exams. The best way is to do a little bit of practice each day.
- Work with your teachers and school counselor to <u>determine the best courses for your 10th grade year</u>. It is important to take classes that will be at the right level of rigor for you. Make sure you check the latest student course catalog and evaluate the courses to make informed decisions regarding your selections for 10th grade. Consider AP core academic classes and AP electives. It is important to take classes that will be at the right level of rigor for you. Make sure you check the latest student course catalog and evaluate the courses to make informed decisions regarding your selections for 11<sup>th</sup> grade. Consider AP core academic classes and AP electives. - Set a plan to take the <u>SAT for the first-time</u> summer after Sophomore year. All students should take the SAT right after Sophomore year or at the latest, fall of Junior year. Colleges do look at the rigor of your coursework senior year as they work through the admission process. - <u>Student Athletes</u> If you haven't yet, make sure to <u>register with the NCAA Eligibility Center</u>
   <u>www.eligibilitycenter.org</u> if you plan on competing in college in sports. You will need to send test scores from



#### Fall

  - Continue to <u>stay involved</u> at school with extracurricular activities including clubs, athletics, and or community service. Now that you are a senior <u>look at leadership opportunities</u> as you continue to serve and participate.

  - o Service Hours All 100 hours must be complete by the end of first semester senior year
  - Continue <u>developing your list</u> of "awards, honors, paid and volunteer work, and extracurricular activities. Update it throughout high school." (studentaid.ed.gov). See your senior project for details. Use this list when filling out your college applications.
- College Applications
  - Continue taking the SAT and/or ACT during the fall. You should have already taken them a few times, so you can continue to try to reach your desired scores. Continue to use the official SAT practice with Khan Academy (<a href="https://www.khanacademy.org/SAT">https://www.khanacademy.org/SAT</a>) and/or practice with the ACT (<a href="https://www.act.org/content/act/en/products-and-services/the-act/test-preparation/free-act-test-prep.html">https://www.act.org/content/act/en/products-and-services/the-act/test-preparation/free-act-test-prep.html</a>)
    - A good target score is the Bright Future's Levels found here: https://www.floridastudentfinancialaidsg.org/PDF/FAS-FMS.pdf.

    - Qualification for Bright Futures continues through the entire senior year. Continue to take the SAT and/or ACT to qualify up through June following high school graduation.
  - Work hard on your college project as you continue to research your top schools. Use your SCOIR account (<a href="https://www.scoir.com/">https://www.scoir.com/</a>) to compare your qualifications with the averages. Try to narrow down to a few schools in each category:
    - Safety Schools You exceed the average requirement with your GPA and SAT or ACT scores
    - Match Schools You are close to the average GPA and SAT or ACT scores
    - Reach Schools You are slightly under the average GPA and SAT or ACT scores
  - Use the results from the YouScience assessment (https://www.youscience.com/ taken in junior year to help determine your top possible majors. Compare and contrast this with the My Next Move and My Career Shines feedback (see Freshman through Junior year parent resources)
  - o Attend the college representative visits during activity period in the media center
  - Consider going to the <u>NACAC Fair</u> at the Jacksonville Prime Osborne Center in October each year. There
    are many different kinds of breakout sessions designed for high school students including the chance to

- Research the dates and deadlines for your colleges. November 1<sup>st</sup> is usually a key deadline for early action/priority application for most public universities in Florida it's the best chance for admission and scholarships. Others have rolling admissions, so make sure to apply as early as possible for best chance of admission.
- Follow the college application process outlined in English class. Make sure to follow the directions for each step carefully:



#### Financial Aid

- The top 3 sources of financial aid are Bright Futures, Federal Government Aid (FAFSA), and Scholarships from Universities
  - <u>Bright Futures</u> You can continue to take the SAT and/or ACT through senior year into June the following year to qualify for Bright Futures.     - Bright Futures can be used in public universities and colleges in the state of florida.

  - <u>FAFSA</u> "As soon as possible after its October 1st release, complete and submit your FAFSA form at <u>fafsa.gov</u>, along with any other financial aid applications your chosen school(s) may require. You should submit your <u>FAFSA form</u> by the earliest financial aid deadline of the schools to which you are applying, usually by early February." (studentaid.ed.gov) Make sure to list the universities
  - <u>University Scholarships</u> Most universities will consider students for scholarships as part of their application process. Please see each universitiy's website for details.

### **Spring**

- Continue to update SCOIR (https://www.scoir.com/) with your admissions results.
- If you have any <u>questions about the financial aid</u> your university has awarded, contact their office.
- <u>Consider taking CLEP</u> (College Level Examination Program) exams by College Board (https://clep.collegeboard.org/ (Links to an external site.)) to earn college credit for a variety of subject areas.
- <u>Visit the colleges and universities you have been accepted to</u> and evaluate all the options for the best fit
  including: academic programs and college majors, cost and financial aid, size, location, and ministry/church
  opportunities
- Most schools require your decision by May 1<sup>st</sup>. Other universities may need a decision earlier, especially for ones where you applied for Early Action. <u>Fill out the information and pay any deposits by the deadlines.</u>
- Check on the orientation process for your school. Registration often begins in spring of senior year.
